Hamster Help

Lesson Plan for *Hamsters* Grade 1

Objective

To help students practice using context clues and glossaries to determine and clarify the meaning of words in a text.

Things Needed

- Hamsters book
- Whiteboard

Before the Activity

Write the following words on the whiteboard: *nocturnal, hoard, territorial, species, gently, companions*.

Activity

Read *Hamsters* out loud to students. On each page with a green glossary word, use the following prompts to help students use context clues to identify the word's meaning. Students can use the glossary on page 23 to check their answers.

- page 4, nocturnal: The book says, "Hamsters are nocturnal. They sleep during the day, and they are awake all night." Based on these sentences, what do you think the word *nocturnal* means?
- page 6, hoard, territorial: The book says, "Hamsters hoard food. They fill their cheeks with food." Based on these sentences, what do you think the word *hoard* means? The book also says, "Hamsters are territorial. They should be kept alone. They will fight other hamsters." Based on these sentences, what do you think the word *territorial* means?
- page 10, species: The book says, "There are more than 20 species of hamsters. Each species looks and acts different." Based on these sentences, what do you think the word *species* means?



 page 21, gently, companions: The book says, "Owners should hold their hamsters gently." Looking at the image on page 20, what do you think the word *gently* means? The book also says, "Hamsters that are treated gently are often friendlier. Hamsters can be good companions." Based on these sentences, what do you think the word *companions* means?

Evaluation

Could students use context clues and/or the glossary to describe what each word meant?
