Seven Kwanzaa Truths

Lesson Plan for *Kwanzaa*

Grade 2

Objective

To help students demonstrate comprehension by answering true-or-false questions about a text read aloud.

Things Needed

- *Kwanzaa* book
- Seven Kwanzaa Truths worksheet (attached)

Before the Activity

Print a copy of the Seven Kwanzaa Truths worksheet for each student.

Activity

Read the *Kwanzaa* book out loud as a class. Then pass out the worksheets. Explain that the worksheet has several true-or-false statements about Kwanzaa, but only seven of them are true. Students should circle the correct answer based on what they remember from the book. If the answer is false, students can earn a bonus point by changing part of the sentence to make it true. They can write this new, correct sentence in the space below the false sentence.

Evaluation

Collect the worksheets and use the attached answer key to correct students' work. Award 1 point for each answer students circled correctly and 1 bonus point for each false statement they corrected. If students get all 7 bonus points, they can score up to 21 points.

Standards

This lesson plan may be used to address the Common Core State Standards' reading standards for informational texts, grade 2 (RI 2.1).
