### **Verifying Vocab**

Lesson Plan for *Cinnamon* Grade 1

#### Objective

To help students use the glossary to help clarify the meaning of words in a text.

#### Things Needed

- Cinnamon book
- Verifying Vocab worksheet (attached)

#### **Before the Activity**

Make sure each student has access to the Verifying Vocab worksheet, or display the worksheet on your screen and make sure each student has a pencil and paper.

#### Activity

Read the *Cinnamon* book out loud to students. On each page with a bold green word, pause to ask students what they think that word means. Students can use the surrounding text and the images for clues. Use the glossary on page 23 to check students' answers.

After finishing the book, have students go through the Verifying Vocab worksheet. Students should use the words in the word box to fill in the blanks. Students can fill out the worksheet on their own. Or they can view the worksheet on your screen and write their answers on a separate sheet of paper.

#### Evaluation

Using the attached answer key, give students 1 point for each correct answer, for up to 6 points.

#### Standards
